1.0: Monday 24/06- VIOLENCE AND CHILD ABUSE

Sub Theme: "Be A Friend Not A Bully"

PRIMARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- Invite the Fiji Sexual Offence Unit, Community Policing, Health, Social Welfare Department, Education officers, Fiji Women's Crisis Centre, Fiji Women Right Movement, Homes of Hopes and other NGOs to talk about Child Abuse, Eliminate all forms of violence in schools. (Please refer to page 10 for stakeholders contacts).
- Parents Involvement class based activity. Teachers must invite a parent from each student to talk in class about the behavior of their child and how to show their own child the love and respect that their need.
- Wy Body Matters Designed for students, focusing on hygiene, nutrition, physical activity, and safety at home, school, and in the community.
- Safety Rules Year 1, 2, 3 & 4 students find out how to seek out safe spaces and how friends can care for and support each other.
- Growing good friends Year 5, 6,7 & 8 students exploring physical activity, nutrition, personal safety, and positive relationships with year 1 & 2 students.

SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- School Assemblies Principal or Child Protection Officer must gather relevant data from Activity Book and present to the schools the amount of offences their District has produced.
- Parents Involvement Class based activity. Teachers must invite a parent from each student to talk in class about the behavior of the child and how to show they own child the love and respect that their need.
- Invite the Fiji Sexual Offence Unit, Community Policing, Health, Social Welfare Department, Education officers, Fiji Women's Crisis Centre, Fiji Women Right Movement, Homes Of Hope and other NGOs to talk about Child Abuse, Eliminate all forms of violence in schools. (Please refer to page 10 for stakeholders contacts).
- Form Time Ask the student to write on the blank paper how to prevent Violence and Child Abuse in schools.

- Invite speakers from a Successful Old scholars to talk in school, faith based, civil society's leaders or community leaders to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Tie Blue color Ribbons tie Blue ribbons on trees, door knobs, fences, desks, tables, etc.
- **Spooky messages –** Create scary messages, e.g. Respect begins and ends with you.
- Skits/dramas, role plays, radio To differentiate respect and disrespect and same as Love.
- Forming a LOVE and RESPECT club with the aim of promoting a positive network amongst students.

Sub Theme: "Respect Your Body"

PRIMARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- Invite the Faith Based Leaders, FJN+, Medical Services Pacific and Reproductive Family Health, Homes of Hope to conduct presentation on the prevention of STI/ HIV / TEENAGE PREGNANCY.
- Distribute pink ribbons to the class on the respective days and display purple ribbons on the front door of your classrooms, in school buildings and in the school offices on the June 25th.
- Making a Difference provides students with the knowledge, confidence, and skills necessary to remain sexually abstinent.
- Skits/dramas, role plays Teach students body boundaries, purity or viginity guarded and save for marriage. Role play for good and bad touch.
- Spooky messages create the messages and display on the doors, windows and classrooms with messages.
- Parents Support invite parents to be present with their child in school during class and discuss with teachers about how to handle this situations at home and the support they need to encounter for their child.

SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- Invite the Faith Based Leaders, FJN+, Medical Services Pacific and Reproductive Family Health, Homes of Hope to conduct presentation on the prevention of STI/ HIV / TEENAGE PREGNANCY
- Parents Support invite parents to be present with their child in school during class and discuss with teachers about how to handle this situations at home and the support they need to encounter for their child.
- Gender meeting awareness of their sexual and reproductive health and rights, protecting them from abuse and connecting them with education and health services.
- Skits/dramas, role plays Teach students body boundaries, purity or viginity guarded and save for marriage. Role play for good and bad touch

- Invite speakers from a Successful Old scholars to talk in school, religious, civil society's leaders or community leaders to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Tie Pink color Ribbons tie Pink ribbons on trees, door knobs, fences, desks, tables, etc.
- **Spooky messages –** Create messages, e.g. stop HIV, Save Sex for Marriage.
- Skits/dramas, role plays, radio To differentiate decision making and how to value their body.
- Promoting positive relationship in school amongst the students.

Sub Theme: "Love Yourself Be Drug Free"

PRIMARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- Invite Fiji Police Drug Unit, Ministry of Health (Public Health Nurse), SAAC officers or Faith Based leaders and Education Officers to discuss the data that they received from school and media.
- Decisions Helping Senior Primary school students navigate the local legal and illegal drugs.
- **Think Twice** Empowering students to inform decision around alcohol consumption.
- Mind your medicine The students need to explore the world of medicines, how they help, affect the body and why some people need them.
- Rethink your drink Tell the students to bring bottle of water / juice/ natural lemonade juice and remind them that those water bottles are healthy for their body.

SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVELS

- Invite Fiji Police Drug Unit, Ministry of Health (Public Health Nurse), NSAAC (PTSM) or Faith Based leaders to discuss the data that they received from school and media.
- Human Body Art Tell the students to draw all human body and draw another human body that is abused by drugs/alcohol. Differentiate the normal and abused body organs. Hang it on the wall for the students to observe.
- Suki). Mind your medicine Impact of Legal Drugs(Alcohol , Tobbacco , Yaqona, Homebrew, Suki).
- Instead of using Drugs Tell the students to take part in leisure activity such as swimming classes, guitar lesson and be a creative Arts.

- Invite speakers from a Success Old scholars to talk in school, religious, civil society's leaders or community leaders to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Tie Red color Ribbons tie Red ribbons on trees, door knobs, fences, desks, tables, etc.
- Spooky messages Create scary messages, e.g. "Stop before its too late".
- Skits/dramas, role plays, radio To do outdoor activity and other activities instead of using drugs.
- 🜷 Forming a drug free club in school with drug free champions.
- Parents Involvement Class based activity. Teachers must invite a parent from each student to talk in class about the harmful of drugs and other substances and how it affect their child future.

Sub Theme : "Think Before You Click"

PRIMARY SCHOOL LEVEL

- Invite speakers from the Police Cybercrime Unit, Information Technology personnel from the Department of Information Technology and Computing Services, Online Safety Commission and Media Watch Fiji to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Increase awareness: Help ensure younger children to know the basics of staying safe online by using techniques like online games and videos that will define computer terms (e.g., cyberbullying, netiquette, virus protection) to establish basic understanding.
- Protect student identity: Remind students never give out personal information, such as name, home address, or telephone number, to anyone they don't know through Facebook, or in online chat rooms or bulletin boards. Talk with your student about the online risks of interacting with outsiders through the computer and sending notes and pictures into cyberspace
- Invite the Police Cybercrime and Policing Community, Health, Social Welfare Department, Education officers and other NGOs representatives to conduct presentations the safety of social media and the impact.
- Skits/dramas, Debate, role plays, radio/TV talkback shows. Effects of social media to education
- Class discussions/role play on social media programme they can participate in and the once that are harmful

SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVEL

- Invite Police Cybercrime and Policing Community, Health, Social Welfare Department, Education officers and other NGOs Information Technology personnel from the Department of Information Technology and Computing Services, Online Safety Commission and Media Watch Fiji to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Organize school based/Year levels activities Prevent cyberbullying: Cyberbullying bullying using electronic technology—can happen anytime and anywhere. Teach students to think through what they post on the Net or Facebook about other people and the consequences those posts could have if they are unkind or mean. Also, keep communication with the student to open and speak up if you suspect someone is bullying him or her.

Be Cyberwise – focus on cyber safety, cyber security and cyber ethics:

Cyber safety: be responsible and respectful while using online technology.

Cyber security: keep personal information safe and not sharing password.

Cyber ethics: Respect fellow cyber citizens and Nurture his/her self-confidence.

- Hold short class debate on pros & cons of social media
- Facilitate class discussion on the different types of social media platforms and their functions
- Discuss creative ways of being safe in a cyber environment
- Parents Involvement provide parents and other community members to aware on the online safety on their child.
- Class discussions/role play on social media programme they can participate in and the once that are harmful

5.0: Thursday 28/06 - MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS DAY

Sub Theme : "Healthy Mind Healthy Child"

PRIMARY SCHOOL LEVEL

- Invite speakers from the Success Old scholars to talk in school, religious, civil society's leaders or community leaders to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- **Unvite** Health Team to conduct health screening in school.
- Advocate Publicize wellness and mental health promote and reinforce healthy eating, physical activity, nutrition education and physical education in order to increase student achievement.
- Invite the Doctors, Public Health nurse,St Giles officers,Agriculture officers, Social Welfare Department, Education officers and other NGOs representatives to conduct presentations on promoting Wellness- combat NCDs "
- Make arrangement with Ministry of Forestry to plant a tree in the school compound
- **Compose Songs** promoting "Wellness and mental health "
- Playing Cards, Drawing, Sing a Song or play lesson movies.
- Contemporary Dances" promoting "Wellness and mental health "
- "Inter-Year Sports" Day school organizes sports support "Wellness and mental health"
- Inter-Year levels debates competition- promoting "Wellness and mental health "
- Oratory Competition promoting "Wellness and mental health "
- 😌 Fruit Day Bring a fruit.

SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVEL

- Plant vegetables and crops on school compound revive school garden involve students each level to plant a vegetables.
- Take a field trip Hospital (St Giles Psychiatric, Stress Management Ward), Joe 's Farm and Fitness Gymnation.
- Practice lots of role play For example, it's a great strategy to use when discussing healthy lifestyle and good mental health.
- Reward students at the end of Wellness- combat NCDs, in the school because "they are all winners for promoting Mental Health.
- **Wake arrangement** with Ministry of Forestry to plant a tree in the school compound

- Invite speakers from a Success Old scholars to talk in school, religious, civil society's leaders or community leaders to launch or close the week long commemoration of IDADAIT.
- Parents Involvement provide parents and other community members with tools, knowledge and resources to help kids eat right and move more at school.
- **Pact** mental health pact with friends, peers in school, promise to hold each other
- Practice organic farming in school growing and nurturing crops without the use of pesticides and fertilizers. Create a peace garden and plant vegetables.










HIV screening is done to all babies born from HIV positive mothers. PMTCT was introduced in 2010 and policy was revised in 2013 [PPTCT] which included Option B plus. PPTCT success rate in 2015 was 75% and soa% in 2016. [a possibility that this data could still be unreported]. Diagnosis of HIV infection in infants is aided by HIV culture or DNA/RNA polymerase chain reaction (PCR); positive results are confirmed by repeating the test. In suspected cases, HIV testing should occur in the newborn period (ice, before the infant is 48 h old), at age 1-2 months, and again at age 3-6 months. Testing at age 14 days may allow for earlier detection of HIV in infants who had negative test results within the first 48 hours of life. By approximately age 1 month, PCR testing has a 96% sensitivity and 99% specificity to identify HIV in bables. Final test at 88 months.



As of February 2017, Fiji has a cumulative total of 747 HIV confirmed cases. Although the 2016 UNAIDS report shows that the number of HIV infection has declined, Fiji depicts otherwise.

ODPP Rape and Sexual Offences Statistics -1 January to 31 December 2018

The following data is authorised for release by the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) and relates to the number of **formal indictments** (*Information*) filed in the High **Courts** of Fiji by the Director of Public Prosecutions. This media update consolidates data released by the ODPP from 1 January to 31 December 2018.

This data is confined to incidents of serious sexual offences only.

There were a total of 215 people charged with a total of 378 separate counts of serious sexual offences as of 31 December 2018. There were 21 people charged that were under the age of 18 years. The youngest accused person charged with rape was an 11 year old boy.

The offences were rape (277), attempted rape (6), assault with intent to rape (1), abduction with intent to rape (7), indecent assault (7), defilement (14) and sexual assault (66).

There were 204 victims of the 378 separate sexual offences. Of the 204, there were 141 victims under the age of 18 years.

All accused persons charged with sexual offences were male however victims of the sexual offences were both male and female comprising of 189 female victims and 15 male victims.

There were 91 offences that occurred in domestic relationships or where the accused was known to the victims.

The youngest victim of serious sexual offences as of 31 December 2018 was a 2-year-old girl who was allegedly raped by her 27-year-old father.

The following data is authorised for release by the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) and relates to the number of **formal indictments** (*Information*) **filed in the High Courts** of Fiji by the Director of Public Prosecutions. This media update consolidates data released by the ODPP from 1 January to 31 December 2018.

This data is confined to incidents of serious crime (non-sexual violence offences) statistics. The yearly statistics for sexual violence offences are recorded and published separately.

This data also includes offences committed by police officers.

There were a total of 783 people charged with a total of 897 separate counts of serious crime offences as of 31 December 2018. There were 72 people charged that were under the age of 18 years.

Of the 783 people charged, 21 were police officers.

The offences for each month were: January (63), February (58), March (71), April (32), May (112), June (73), July (66), August (144), September (92), October (83), November (73), December (30).

There were 564 victims of the 897 separate serious offences. Of the 564, there were 71 offences where the accused and victim were related to one another.
